Title: Multiculturalization of German Society and Support for Child Raising in Immigrant Families - From the 1970s to Today

Dr. Donata Elschenbroich

Donata Elschenbroich will, starting from an assessment of migration as a universal phenomenon in the history of mankind, focus on the specific experience of "guestworker" migration, and more recently, of refugee acceptance within the national state of Germany.

She will recall the debates of the early years of guestworker presence in Germany and their gradual effects on the changing self concept of Germany as a factual immigration country, including the responsibility to grant equal educational rights to children with migrant background, meanwhile in the second or third generation.

She will revisit some of the materials and projects for early years education, designed by her and her colleagues in the wake of multicultural education in the 80s as special support for guestworker families. What is Germanness? And what can be learnt from research on immigration and ethnicity in a classical immigration country, the US?

Multiculturalism in Germany today, every fourth citizen with a migrant background: a glass half full, half empty? Hopes and frictions. Can multicultural experience in kindergarten widen the horizon of everyone involved, children, parents, educators?
